Define it: To be free from legal, social, or political restrictions; liberated.

Other words you might associate with this:

Liberate: To set free, often from oppression.

Manumit: Specifically, to free from slavery.

Release: To let go or set free.

Unshackle/Unchain: To remove bonds or chains.

Enfranchise: To grant rights or citizenship, often political.

Read and say it:
emancipate
(verb)

Use it: There was a Spartan law forbidding masters to **emancipate** their slaves.

Deconstruct it:
from Latin *emancipat-* 'transferred as property', from the verb *emancipare*, from e- (variant of ex-) 'out' + *mancipium* 'slave'.
