Performing	Playing your musical instrument.	Spend time playing your musical instrument. Perhaps learn a new song / piece?	
	Learn to play a new musical instrument. Maybe you have an instrument at home that you can't play - try giving it a go!	Use the internet, or ask a family member, to teach you to play a musical instrument.	Lots of useful free tutorials on the internet.

	Write some lyrics (words) for a song. Use the music to the piece called 'In the Mood' by Glenn Miller. There aren't any words yet - you are going to add them. There is a small introduction at the beginning of this piece.	 Write some lyrics (words) for a song. Making up your own music is called composition. People who write song words are called lyricists. When it comes to composing words there are no set rules. You can write a song any way you want to. The important thing is that you enjoy creating it. A song usually tells a story - yours can be about anything. It can have sections, lines or words that repeat. You only need enough words to fit with the main tune.
