Focus on Geography

In Geography this term, year 8 have been looking at a topic called The Dangerous Earth. In this topic the students examine the structure of the Earth, plate tectonics, earthquakes and volcanoes. The recent devastating earthquake in Turkey and Syria brought into sharp focus the power and destructive forces within out planet. We used this earthquake as a stimulus to our lessons and we examined some of the causes and effects of earthquakes in Turkey and looked at the effects on the country, its towns and cities and the people.



Meanwhile, year 7 have been looking at how the

shape of our landscapes can be changed by the effects of weathering and erosion. We have considered how buildings can be affected by these processes and the students have undertaken some fieldwork in the school grounds to investigate how our school buildings, paths and roadways are not immune to the power of weathering.

Year 6 have started a topic called 'The Local and Global Environment' and are currently exploring the huge impact that plastic pollution is having on our oceans. Hopefully, they will become more aware of their role in reducing the effect of pollution on the environment by re-using and recycling plastic products and packaging.


Focus on Science

During 10th-19th March, the science department and the whole school celebrated British Science Week. The theme for this year was "connections". As part of the activities, all pupils were invited to take part in a House poster competition—pupils made connections from David Attenborough and various aspects of the environment and how space links to atoms, elements and compounds. The winners of our own competition will be entered into the British



Science Week national poster competition good luck to those involved!

Additionally, there were a range of extra activities undertaken in STEM Club, including a challenge for the group to make a Boston glider from diagram information and being only able to ask three questions. All pupils rose to the challenge and successfully built some great gliders by the end of the session.



Focus on Careers and PSHE

Bredon Hill Academy pupils have been actively learning about the skills and attributes they will need in the future. We celebrated National Careers Week by having assemblies learning about essential skills and also looking at a range of careers. Some pupils had the opportunity to visit the offices of PwC in Birmingham to experience life in an office, as well as carrying out a variety of tasks which will help them build essential skills such as teamwork and using their initiative.

Ensuring that my logo is mathematical, I drew a variety of symbols used in maths to show that people use maths everywhere.


Careers in maths should be available to everyone no matter where they are from.

Focus on English


This term has been a lively and vivacious one in English, despite the weather—our pupils' learning has gone from strength to strength in English. Mr Mills, our School Improvement Partner, has visited the department as part of our on-going monitoring, evaluating and improving process.

The year six cohort have immersed themselves in poetry and refining their skills for reading. The pupils continued to develop their retrieval, comprehension, summary, questioning and inferring skills whilst reading the texts. They all improved their writing skills by completing their own range of poems. In particular, pupils developed vocabulary choices, sentence structures and have been exploring the effect punctuation choices have. All year six pupils have been provided with a CGP book to aid their revision of KS2 learning. At present, Year 6 are also using the Spelling Frame website to consolidate spelling knowledge. The year six cohort also behaved superbly during the March SATs experience and applied themselves diligently. Well done, year six.





Year seven continue to explore the concepts of heroism and villainy. Chaucer's 'The Knight's Tale' has been explored and dissected as a text from the English canon of literature. The year group have continued to question: how do pupils use quotes to support their opinions whilst exploring how writers construct continuous texts? They have been studying how Chaucer's characters come across to a modern reader. They have had many varied thoughts and they have conveyed these through their written responses. We have enjoyed reading their carefully crafted tales too. They are moving to learning about how poets employ heroes and villains in the poetic form.







Year eight learning continues to be based around the concept of 'conflict' in English. They have all been given the opportunity to learn about Aristo-

tle's 'Art of Rhetoric' and were inspired by modern voices such as Emma Watson, Greta Thunberg and the Obamas. The speeches that year 8 then crafted and delivered on a variety of personally selected topics were engaging, mature and emotional. The cohort are now studying Shakespeare's 'The Tempest' which focuses on conflict and how different characters manage these experiences. It is inspiring to see the pupils thoughtfully responding to this great text. We also enjoyed a fabulous trip on 2nd March to the Royal Shakespeare Theatre to watch the text in



performance. Some Year 8 pupils have also been involved in a drama workshop with Mrs Cook, Subject Lead for Drama at Prince Henry's High School.

The whole school took part in our 'Red Card Against Racism' and 'World Book Day' competitions and we have enjoyed judging the entries. This gave pupils the opportunity to respond to reading personally, creatively and with pleasure. We wish we could showcase all of them! Congratulations to Castle House who were the overall winners with Vale and Tower as runners up in the interhouse competition.

Focus on French


Fifty five of our year 7 pupils recently had the opportunity to visit Saint-Leonard des Bois, in Normandie.

After a very early start and a long coach and train ride to their destination, the pupils soon settled into their new surroundings and got stuck into some delicious food. Over the course of five days, the group spent a day at our partner school in Mamers, giving them the perfect opportunity to meet their penpals and practise French speaking skills. They also visited the Chateau de Fougeres, reinforcing history studies

of medieval castles; explored the beautiful Mont-Saint-Michel; visited local shops and markets to sample local delicacies and purchase souvenirs and had a truly fantastic visit at Les Chèvres de la Saffrie, learning all about goats' cheese and getting the opportunity to give the newly born kids a little cuddle.









Meanwhile, back at school, the rest of year seven experienced a little taste of France as Mme Dorrell ran a French café with the support of some very attentive year 8 waiters to support pupils' speaking and listening skills and even Mr Bishop's computing enrichment session had a French twist to it!



- Also in panathletics, we are the KS2 County Champions and the pupils involved—Evelyn E, Penny L, Isla S, Inna H, Mathew D, Dylan K and Alistair S now go onto represent the County in the national finals next term. Our KS3 team were runners-up —well done to you all.
- Reece Y in year 6, Kipp S in year 7 and Scarlett E in year 8 represented
 Hereford and Worcestershire at the National Cross Country Finals after
 successful district trials. All three did tremendously well in tough
 conditions—Kipp and Reece both finished second for Hereford and
 Worcestershire and Scarlett fourth. A big 'well done' also goes to the
 large number of pupils who represented the school and region in the
 district and county finals.
- Within inter-house competitions, 7 Hill have been crowned netball champions and Hill also followed up this success in the year 6 competition. The theme for this year is 'the pollinators' - highlighting the dramatic decline in bees, butterflies and other key pollinators that are essential for successful pollination of plants and the future of fruit, vegetable and cereal crops. It is hoped that visitors will reconsider some of their actions as a result of their awareness being heightened.

Miss Bankes works tirelessly to ensure our school grounds are a quiet space of tranquillity to support pupil wellbeing, learning and biodiversity. One of our Enrichment sessions on a Thursday afternoon focuses on using a range of strategies, including outdoor spaces, to support wellbeing. Additionally, every form group has its own planting patch within our 'Friendship Gardens' to enable a sense of pupil ownership of our grounds and to nurture a natural curiosity of gardening. The Eco-Council form an active part of our school life, meeting once a month to explore how we can best support eco-diversity and the environment by making small adaptations to our own lives or activities within school.
