Activities Galore!

The final few weeks of term have been crammed full with a range of activities, allowing pupils to open their minds to the world beyond the curriculum—supporting teamwork, communication and celebrating a fantastic year of learning.

Year 6 had a lovely day at Cotswold Wildlife Park, exploring the scenery, vast array of animals and, seemingly most importantly, visiting the gift shop!



Year 6 also had an in-school activities day, completing a carousel of activities comprising:

drama skills, Lego marble-runs, bridge construction, dance, music and Minecraft. Additionally, all of our year 6 pupils have spent time off-timetable learning some vital first aid skills, including how to make an emergency call. We hope this session will give them the confidence they need to help others in a variety of different situations, if the need ever arises. They have also learned about law and order with a visit from the Worcestershire Magistracy. The talk complemented their understanding of community, British Values and the Rules of Law.



Earlier in the term, the year group celebrated the end of their SATs examinations with a much-deserved walk up Bredon Hill. A large number of pupils had never experienced the stunning views of the surrounding countryside and it offered a perfect time to reflect on what had been a very busy and successful week.



Over the course of two days, the whole of year 7 visited Compton Verney, enriching their understanding of art. As well as picking up some top tips on their artistic technique, pupils were able to explore an exhibition by renowned illustrator Quentin Blake and an outside installation by Morag Myerscough, which focused on creating a sense of joy and belonging through colour and sound. We look forward to seeing how this deeper understanding of art will be demonstrated by pupils in their art lessons next year.



Year 7 spent their activities day at Aztec Adventure over in Upton Warren. The year group had a fantastic time on the aqua park, making the most of the glorious weather and the challenging obstacle course.





The weather was, sadly, not so kind to year 8, who visited Bonkers in Pershore for their end of year activity. Year 8 York Trip

In June, 90 Year 8 pupils and 10 members of staff travelled by coach to York for a three day residential trip. This is the first time, as a school, that we have visited York and it did not disappoint!

Day 1: On arrival, we visited the National Railway Museum, which tells the story of rail transport in Britain and its impact on society. It is also the current home to the *Flying Scotsman*, which is celebrating its 100 year anniversary. Following this, we took a river boat cruise through the city on the River Ouse – this was a good opportunity to see the city from a different angle and hear about the escapades of Guy Fawkes. After checking into the hotel, we had a fantastic dinner of pizza at Valentino's restaurant and an evening playing football in the park.

Day 2: A very busy day involving much walking – luckily the weather held out! The first visit was to York's Chocolate Story, where we learned about the production process and history of chocolate making in York. We all had the opportunity to make our own chocolate. Our tour guide then took us on a walk around the city with a stop at The Shambles, which is a medieval street with houses dating back as far as the 14th Century. Pupils enjoyed some free time here to explore the array of shops.

Lunchtime was spent in the Yorkshire Museum Gardens, enjoying a packed lunch provided for us by a local company. We then explored part of the city walls, which is a scheduled monument encircling the ancient city of York; the views of the city were amazing! The walls comprise of 2 miles of surviving masonry – the longest town walls in England. We stood in one of the 'bars', one of the gates protecting the city, and heard gory tales of heads being placed on spikes!

Our final visit of the day was to the Castle Museum, where we were able to experience hundreds of years of York's history including Kirkgate, a recreated Victorian street, and York Castle Prison, which was once a Georgian prison.

After visiting Valentino's for a pasta dinner, it was time for our ghost tour of York! Our guides took us to various sites within the city walls where we heard gory stories of murder and death and the resulting ghosts and hauntings.



Day 3: The final day of our visit and the day many were looking forward to.

It began with a visit to the York Dungeon where we were scared witless by live actor shows telling 200 years of York's dark history. Characters included Vikings, Guy Fawkes and finally— the scariest of all— Isabella Billington, a Yorkshire witch.

Our final visit was to York Minster, the largest Gothic cathedral in Northern Europe. Many of us climbed the 275 steps up the tower to see the amazing views of the city and surrounding areas, whilst the rest of us explored the interior of the Minster with its 2 million pieces of stained glass in 128 windows.

Everyone, pupils and staff, thoroughly enjoyed our stay in York – a big 'thank you' to everyone for making it such a fantastic trip!

The final two weeks of term have seen an absolutely enormous—over 1000—certificates and awards being handed out to pupils, celebrating their successes and endeavours. These have included Zero Hero awards, house point certificates, subject commendations, school values ambassadors and many more linked to house and out of school competitions. UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge

The Junior Mathematical Challenge is a 60-minute, multiple-choice challenge. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems.

The problems on the Junior Mathematical Challenge are designed to make students think. Most are accessible, yet still challenge those with more experience.

In April, 60 of our Year 8s and 10 of our Year 7s took part in the challenge. Pupils were awarded certificates as follows: 29 Bronze, 15 Silver and 3 Gold. All other pupils received a certificate of participation.

Congratulations to Tymoteusz K, who was awarded Best in Year 7. Our Gold award winners were Charlotte F, Jack B and Susannah G. Pleasingly, Charlotte also made it through to the next round – the Junior Kangaroo. She took part in this, achieving a very respectable score. Well done to all of our participants!



History Update

In history, Year 6 have been reviewing the KS1 and KS2 history curriculum and have been recalling information on British history from the Stone Age to the 1960s in the twentieth century and ancient civilisations such as the Egyptians, Greeks, Maya and Romans. We are finishing the year by making a scene or something that you would associate with a particular time period, such as an Egyptian pyramid or snake headband, Roman gladiator or Celtic Roundhouse. The year 6 interhouse competition was based on a word wheel challenge to find as many words to do with the ancient Greeks as they could find and a nine-letter word.

Year 7 have started to look at the Reformation and the consequences of the actions of each Tudor monarch. Their interhouse competition was to complete a challenging wordsearch based on catholic and protestant beliefs and ideas. They find the words and then write down underneath under a heading of catholic or protestant. Year 8 are examining the USA in the 1920s. Learning how our modern world was born and the contrasts in how people were living. Those that were part of the 'Roaring Twenties' and those that faced harsh prejudice and intolerance such as African Americans and immigrants. They have also completed an interhouse challenge of putting together jigsaw pieces of the United States of America.



Summer Concert

We were able to host our Summer Concert on 5th July to showcase our many artistic talents. Musical numbers were performed by the BHA Band and Singers as solo and ensemble numbers. Pupils had the opportunity to choose their own musical material, performing to an audience of parents and friends. It was a great opportunity to showcase artwork from all years, demonstrating the artistic journey our pupils take. Some of our Year 8 pupils wrote and presented some thought-provoking speeches on a topic close to them, captivating the audience. A great evening of entertainment!



Trauma Informed Schools

This year, Mrs Dunkley has completed a diploma in Trauma Informed Schools and is now a Trauma Informed Schools practitioner. Mrs Dunkley is very much looking forward to sharing her knowledge and understanding with the rest of our school staff, so that we can all have a better understanding of helping those pupils who have lived experiences of trauma.

Geography Update



In Geography Year 8 have been looking at a topic called The Dangerous Earth. In this topic the students examine the structure of the Earth, plate tectonics, earthquakes and volcanoes. The recent devastating earthquake in Turkey and Syria brought into sharp focus the power and destructive forces within our planet. We used this earthquake as a stimulus to our lessons and we examined some of the causes and effects of earthquakes in Turkey and looked at the effects on the country, its towns and cities and the people.

Year 8 followed this topic with work that looked at China. They looked at the reasons why it has managed to grow its economy so rapidly and they examined the city of Chongqing, one of the fastest growing cities in the world.

Meanwhile Year 7 have been looking at how the shape of our landscapes can be changed by the effect of weathering and erosion. We have looked at how buildings can be affected by these processes and the students have undertaken some fieldwork in the school grounds to investigate how our school buildings, paths and roadways are not immune to the power of weathering. They then went on to look at how sea erosion changes the coastline with a focus on the Jurassic coast around Swanage.



Year 6 have just completed a topic called The Local and Global Environment and have investigated the huge impact that plastic pollution is having on our oceans. Hopefully they will become more aware of their role in reducing the effect of pollution on the environment by re-using and recycling plastic products and packaging. They also examined the effect of producing electricity and how it contributes to air pollution and climate change.



English Learning in The Summer Term

This term has been an outward looking and dramatic one. Our students' learning continues to go from strength to strength in English.



The year six cohort have immersed themselves in writing for their portfolios. They enjoyed imagining they were characters from Lewis Carroll's 'Alice in Wonderland' writing to complain in a formal letter to the Queen of Hearts.



They all developed their writing skills by

completing their own writing based around our outstanding gardens for Ashton-Under-Hill Open Gardens. They all produced information leaflets for visitors. The students continued to develop their retrieval, comprehension, summary, questioning and inferring skills whilst reading a selection of shared novels. In particular, students continued developing vocabulary choices, sentence structures and have been exploring the effect punctuation choices have. The year six cohort also behaved superbly during the May SATs and applied themselves diligently. Well done, year six. We are proud of you.



Year seven continue to explore the concepts of heroism and villainy. This term they have explored Shakespeare's 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'. They have developed their understanding of the historical context of the play and how actors take the text and work it into a performance. The cohort have been developing their creation of metaphors thinking about tenor, vehicle and ground. They enjoyed a workshop by the company West End in Schools.



Year eight learning continued to be based around the concept of 'conflict' in English. They completed analytical look at Shakespeare's 'The Tempest'. They have all been engaging with the language, historical context and the idea of text in performance over the early part of the term. They have all then been given the opportunity to learn about the genre of Science Fiction focused

around conflict and how different writers craft these experiences for readers. They have been crafting their own stories and graphic novels based on those by H. G. Wells, Ray Bradbury, Douglas Adams and John Wyndham.



Reading buddies has helped to boost reading skills this year and build academic relationships between year groups. We look forward to growing this group next year. Dyslexia Gold and the Thursday group have been helping to support our students who have diagnoses. We are looking to develop this support next year. Spelling frame has engaged and supported our year 6 learners this year. We have enjoyed entering The Day Celebration writing competition, and whilst we were not winners, the runners up received a certificate.

All students in years 6 and 7 have been issued with our Summer Reading Bingo Challenge. The challenge is also on our website in case a new copy is required over the summer. We have also included a copy below—you may like to get involved yourselves as families, too. This is a great way to counteract the summer dip and start September with house-points, commendations or an award. 
House Logo Competition

SATs Results 2023



The tests are based on work covered throughout KS2, from years 3-6.
