Literacy is the language of learning, both in fiction and non-fiction.

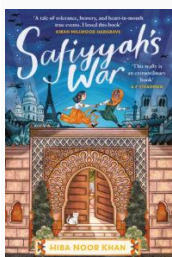

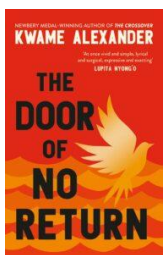
### Saffiyah's War

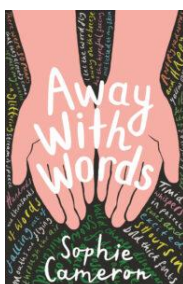
### The Door of No Return

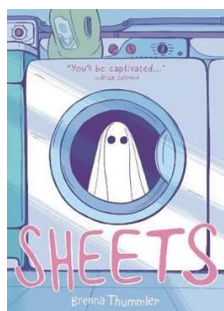
### Away With Words
